- 1920's pulp mills, saw mills, and City using Fidalgo Island's lakes
- Land Protected for watershed purposes
- 1931- City and industries begin relying on Water from Skagit River

- 1979 Committee created for management plan
- "Protect it, but let it be a self-supporting entity."
- 1981 Plan adopted to include multi-user interface




